From the Chair

Our thanks for all he contributed to the Council and village events, and farewell to Andrew Steward who has now stepped down from the Council. However we are very pleased to welcome David Butcher. David is a relative newcomer to the Village but has already initiated the launch of the new web-site, which we hope will be able to provide a valuable link to all village activities, messages and information.

As reported in the last Newsletter, John Hurley stepped down as Chair in May, after 7-years' service. John's wise and knowledgeable leadership has been really appreciated and he will be greatly missed.

The baton has been passed to me, and I will do my best to continue the good work. John leaves the Council in May '23, so we'll be looking for new members. We'd particularly welcome anyone from a more diverse background (location or demography). It's not a life sentence, but it is a great opportunity to do your part, to help keep Gretton a great place to live.

Next year's Council budget and goals

The Council is funded by a small allocation from our Council Tax - the 'precept'. Next year (April '23 – '24), in recognition of the pressure on household budgets, we will freeze this precept.

However, this will still allow us to do useful work, continuing our key themes, identified from the last village questionnaire; - Improving communications across the community; maintaining and improving the Playing Field; addressing traffic concerns and improving the Gretton environment - keeping it rural, greener and safe.

Looking back at 2022 - and forward to 23

Since the last issue we have continued working with other authorities and village groups to improve the village environment and amenities and to revitalise the social life of the village in the aftermath of Covid. This work will continue into next year.

Road safety

The speedwatch initiative has revealed the high number of motorists breaking the speed limit as Mark Oliver reports on p3 opposite. The parish council will continue to invest in the new road safety measures he outlines, with County Council help.

New dustbin stickers to discourage speeding are available from councillors if you would like to help slow traffic on the main road.



After two years of lobbying by the Parish Council and the School the footpath outside the old Bugatti Inn has, at last, been installed although concerns remain about the height of the kerb. We will monitor.

Traffic Safety - combating excessive speeds in Gretton

Keeping our residents and visitors safe is of the utmost importance and continues to be a key focus for the Parish Council. A number of initiatives are underway:

- Community Speedwatch. The team of volunteers can be regularly seen monitoring traffic through the village. Around half of all traffic continues to exceed the speed limit and around 10% of traffic exceeds 35 mph.The team work closely with the Police and so far 110 people have received a warning letter or visit from the Police. The Police inform us that the majority of "offenders" are local residents so please help make Gretton a safer place by slowing down.
- Improved Signage. In conjunction with Community Speedwatch we now have some "wheelie bin" speed reminders available so please ask for one. We have also requested refreshed road markings at the village entrances and are working to install a village gateway at the Alderton approach.

• Finally, the vehicle activated speed indicator at the Winchcombe entrance continues to be effective and we are now investigating another device for use elsewhere in the village. There is also a device in Gretton Fields

Dialogue is underway with Gloucestershire County Council to improve the Redwood Close Junction and in particular its proximity to the change in speed limit.

Environmental improvement - enhancing the village

The Parish Council has carried out improvements to the village green. The Hornbeam tree has been pruned to make it more in scale with the space. The Coronation bench and the notice board have both been replaced. The Gloucestershire County Council Build Back Better fund co-funded the bench.

Coronation plaques for the Queen and new King will be fitted to the new bench. The notice board celebrates the Queen's platinum Jubilee. The larger board provides 3 sections for GPC, village community and general notices.

The area of wildflower sowing on half of the village green was not well received by residents and has now been returned to mown grass. There is the



possibility of creating a wildflower area on the bank in front of Barn Close. In view of the reaction to the village green sowing, we would like to canvass village opinions on this possibility.

Facebook: Research shows that Facebook has maximum reach in communities such as ours. We have introduced a new Facebook Page "Gretton Village Notices" which will act as a virtual noticeboard to share important information. Dog Fouling remains an unacceptable nuisance

Dog fouling sadly continues to be a nuisance in the village. Tewkesbury Borough Council has recently introduced a public space

protection order requiring that:

• A person in control of a dog
must ensure that dog faeces are

- must ensure that dog faeces are removed from the land immediately

 A person in control of a dog
- A person in control of a dog must ensure that they have means available to clear up dog faeces
- A person in control of a dog must ensure that dog faeces are disposed of in an appropriate receptacle

New signs have been installed. The order is enforceable and failure to comply may result in a fixed penalty fine of up to £100 or prosecution.



You can report non-compliances anonymously through the Tewkesbury Borough Council website.

It is right that we are open about the process and criteria we use to decide whether to comment on or object to an application which can be anything from a replacement window to a developer's proposal.

Other activities being discussed include opening the Hall for a "Gretton Hub" drop in where people can gather for a warm drink, food and catchup.

It will be great to see people getting together and if you have any ideas or would like to help please get in touch with a committee member.

Village Hall and Playing Field Development

The Village Hall and playing field are essential facilities at the heart of the Gretton community. They are owned by the GVA charity and managed by the GVA committee. They are widely used by the community and the school.

However, following feedback from users and from the Village consultation (at the end of 2021), we wish to improve these facilities to meet current requirements and ensure the viability of the Hall.

New play equipment, more green areas and better accessibility for all, should encourage greater use of the Field and the Village Hall.

We've developed plans, which have been on display, are now on the new website, and have been discussed with Tewkesbury Borough Council (note pre-submission 22/00042/PRE).

We have some funds available, arising from the Redbrook Close development (known as 'S106 Contribution'). This has to be used for the hall and playing field. We will need to fund-raise some more, but it's a great project and we are hopeful of success. We're currently talking to contractors and will then submit formal plans

to Tewkesbury planners.

As we approach planning the project will gain momentum and help will be needed from the community to finalise plans and help with aspects of implementation. Volunteers are welcome to help this exciting project.

The village was decorated, a village clean-up conducted, the phone box refurbished and the Church hosted a Flower Festival, Jubilee Service and a Pimms Reception. On the Saturday a full days entertainment commenced with the children parading from the school before the official opening by the Lord Lieutenant of Gloucestershire. An afternoon picnic was followed by races and a range of activities, food and drink and the day closed by a very enjoyable square dance. The day was enjoyed by approaching 300 people.



A grant from the Gloucestershire County Councils Build Back Better Scheme supported our celebrations and the establishment of a new Jubilee bench on the Village Green.

Apple Rock is a traditional event in the village. Residents bring their apples for pressing and enjoy entertainment together with the chance to sample last vears cider!

The day was once again a tremendous success. During the afternoon Friends of Gretton School put on some wonderful entertainment for the children whilst the bar and pork baps kept the adults happy. As night fell the Apple Mashers played to a packed hall.

This year's event was poignant as one of the event founders, Nick Sharman passed away earlier in the year. It was a chance to remember Nick and raise money for Winston's Wish – the charity selected by his family.

Some £626 was donated to Winston's Wish and Friends of Gretton School made over £300 for the School.

Gretton Tower Trust

Now the Tower has been restored work is proceeding on the maintenance of the ancient monument grounds as quickly as resources allow.

A new gate has been installed, with help from Gloucestershire County Councils Build Back Better fund which allows safe access to the site.

A policy of light mowing of the grounds allows the native wildflowers,



already present there to flourish. Future plans include repair of the stone walls, improved signage to the Tower and some improved historical information, possibly in the form of display boards.

The Tower looked very splendid when it was illuminated at the last Christmas Eve advent windows event and we will be participating once more in this lovely village evening.

OFSTED Inspection

The village church of Christ Church is part of the Parish of Winchcombe.


s with many, the village church has had to cope with the effects of the pandemic, but also with the Rev'd John Paul Hoskins leaving last January to take up a post at Worcester Cathedral.

An interregnum is in place. This means that the Parish, including Gretton, has been maintained by retired clergy and lay readers. So, the usual weekly services at Gretton have been reduced to two – at present Holy Communion is on the 2nd Sunday, and Morning Worship on the 4th Sunday.

We are so grateful to all those who have led the services, particularly Rev'd Mike Holloway, who has led most communion services and has introduced a short Morning Prayer here every Thursday at 9:30am. He has also given time to join church members at important village meetings about future social initiatives.

Many families will remember the Carols in the Churchyard that Mike led last Christmas Eve. He plans another family Carols in the Churchyard this Christmas Eve at 4pm, followed by viewing the beautiful illuminated Crib in church. Let's hope for a drier afternoon!

In February 2023 we look forward to our new vicar, Rev'd Captain David Penny, his wife Deborah and their daughter settling in to the Rectory in Winchcombe. David was born a West Country man but has spent much of his ordained ministry in the Diocese of Manchester, where for the past 17 years he has been vicar of the church of St Matthew and St Luke, Chadderton, outside Oldham. Rev'd Penny will be licensed at a service at St Peter's, Winchcombe on Monday February 27th at 7pm. It is hoped that many in the Parish, including Gretton, will come to welcome him and his family at this special service.



An automatic locking system now allows the church to be open every day between 9am and 4pm for any visitor to appreciate the peace and beauty of our village church.
